

Currently in movie theaters is the story of Cambridge University physicist Stephen Hawking, and his battle with the debilitating illness Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS), also known as "Lou Gehrig's disease."

In his best-selling book <u>A Brief History of Time</u>, Hawking theorized that time has no beginning and no end; time exists from eternity, to eternity. Hawking is correct in his description, but he is describing the wrong thing. For, it is not time itself which has no beginning and no end, but the Creator of time, the eternal God.

God has no beginning and no end; God exists from eternity, to eternity. It is difficult to put this concept into words, but this is how Moses expresses the eternity of God in Psalm 90:1-2: "Lord, You have been our dwelling place throughout all generations. Before the mountains were born or You brought forth the earth and the world, from everlasting to everlasting, You are God."

Contrary to Hawking's theory that time is infinite and eternal, the Scriptures report that the phenomenon of time was created by God: "In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth . . . And God said, 'Let there be lights in the expanse of the sky to separate the day

from the night, and let them serve as signs to mark seasons, days, and years" (Genesis 1:1, 14).

So, the Bible tells us that the steady march of time had a definite beginning, and it will also have a definite end, at the end of all things. : "But the day of the Lord will come like a thief. The heavens will disappear with a roar; the elements will be destroyed by fire, and the earth and everything in it will be laid bare. . . That day will bring about the destruction of the heavens by fire, and the elements will melt in the heat" (2 Peter 3:10, 12).

Like a clock that is wound and slowly progresses through the hours, God has set time into motion, and He has fixed a certain point at which time will end. This is not only true in the grand scheme of the universe, but also for each of us as individuals. As Psalm 139:16 says, "All the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to pass."

God has allotted to each of us a precious treasure: a certain amount of time, to serve Him here on earth.

God has set your life into motion, and He has allotted to you a certain number of days. As Psalm 31:15 says, "My times are in your hands," and Psalm 90:12 says, "Teach us to number our days aright." God has fixed a time when your earthly life will end and He will take you out of the realm of time and into His eternal kingdom.

While you remain here on earth, your most precious possession is the time God has allotted you. The old song says, "If I could put time in a bottle." But, you cannot halt the unyielding march of days. Like a clock ticking away, time

progresses invariably. Like a precious treasure, your days on earth are spent, never to be returned or relived. You cannot "put time in a bottle," you cannot save up extra time for the future. And you cannot borrow or buy extra time, as Jesus says in Matthew 6:27, "Who of you by worrying can add a single hour to his life?"

Your Master is returning, the clock is running, your time on earth is precious. Make the most of every opportunity—use the irreplaceable treasure of your time to serve Him.

Jesus told the Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25:14-30), about three men, each given a certain amount of money by their master to invest and use while the master was away on a trip. And when he returned, two of the servants had wisely used the money and gotten a good return. But, one of the servants, wicked and lazy, hid his portion away, did not use it, had not gained anything for his master.

Like the master in the parable, God has allotted to each of us a precious treasure: a certain amount of time, to serve Him here on earth. And when He comes again, He expects to see that we each have used our time wisely and well, that we each have invested our time to serve Him and spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

St. Paul says in Colossians 4:5, "Make the most of every opportunity." When God calls for an accounting of the time allotted to you, will He commend you for making the most of every opportunity, for serving the Lord with gladness, for giving to Him and His service the proper portion of your life?

St. Paul says in 1 Corinthians 7:29, "Brothers, the time is short." Another year has passed, so quickly. Over this past year good resolutions and good intentions have fallen by the way. The precious treasure of time has too often been wasted.

The Lord will bless you in the year to come, and finally grant you everlasting time in the eternal bliss of heaven.

Jesus says in Revelation 22:7, "Behold, Iam coming quickly!" Your Master is returning, the clock is running, your time on earth is precious. Make not just good resolutions and good intentions. Make the most of every opportunity. As St. Paul says in Colossians 3:17, "And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him."

In this New Year, use your most precious, irreplaceable treasure—your time—to serve the Lord with gladness. Even as the Lord has blessed you in ages past, He will bless you in the year to come, and He will finally grant you the gift of everlasting time in the eternal bliss of heaven.

Former Muslims Baptized at LCMS Partner Congregation

On August 4, 2014, a newspaper in Leipzig, Germany ran an article with the headline, "Leipzig's Most Dangerous Baptisms: Here Muslims Become Christians."

The article was referring to the baptisms of four former Muslims on July 27 at St. Trinitatisgemeinde (Holy Trinity Lutheran Church) in Leipzig, a congregation of the Independent Evangelical Lutheran Church (SELK), which is separate from the state church and in partnership with the LCMS.

On that Sunday, Rev. Hugo Gevers, SELK missionary to the migrant population of Leipzig, baptized a husband and wife along with two other men. A special feature of these Baptisms was that during the time when the candidate denounces the devil and his works, these former Muslims also denounced their former faith. In a pointed reversal of the traditional Islamic profession of faith, they boldly proclaimed, "I renounce Islam, and confess that neither is the Koran God's revelation, nor is Mohammed God's prophet."

It was a poignant moment, Gevers pointed out, because many of these new Christians actually had Christian ancestors, who centuries ago had been forced by threats of death to renounce Christianity and covert to Islam. Now, their descendants have returned to the faith—not out of fear, but in sincere faith and with great joy.

However, this joyous moment was also for them a fearful turning point in

their lives. For, as they confessed the one true faith in the Apostles' Creed, and then Rev. Gevers spoke the Baptismal formula and poured water on their heads in the Name of the Triune God, they were not only are marked as children of God, sharers in Christ's death and resurrection, and members of God's family. At that moment they were also marked for death—the punishment prescribed in the Koran for leaving Islam, and still often carried out against those who convert to Christianity, even in Western countries such as Germany.

Despite such threats, 49-year-old Eizadi Shahriyar says of his Baptism, "This was very beautiful for me. It was as if I knocked on a door, and it opened, and everything was wonderful. . . I have hope now. Everything is different in my life. My outlook on the future is also very different. . . To me the peace that I have in faith is most important, and therefore I do not think of the fear anymore."
