As we celebrate the Fourth of July, it is a good time to recall what the Bible says about government:

• Government is established by God.

Contrary to popular belief, government is not a human invention. God himself has established government for our good. As St. Paul writes in Romans 13:1-2: "There is no authority except that which God has established. The authorities that exist have been established by God."

- Government is to maintain order. This is the main purpose for which God established government. St. Paul says of our rulers in Romans 13:4: "He is God's servant to do you good. But if you do wrong, be afraid, for he does not bear the sword for nothing. He is God's servant, an agent of wrath to bring punishment on the wrongdoer."
- God commands us to honor our governmental leaders. Those who serve in government are deserving of our honor and respect, as St. Paul tells us in Romans 13:7: "Give everyone what you owe him . . . if respect, then repect; if honor, then honor."
- God commands us to obey our rulers. St. Paul explains in Romans 13:1-2: "Everyone must submit himself to the governing authorities, for there is no authority except that which God has established. The authorities that exist have been established by God. Consequently, he who rebels against the authority

is rebelling against what God has instituted." And St. Paul writes to the young pastor Titus: "Remind the people to be subject to rulers and authorities, to be obedient, to be ready to do whatever is good" (Titus 3:1). Likewise, St. Peter says: "Submit yourselves for the Lord's sake to every authority instituted among men" (1 Peter 2:13).

- We may—and must—disobey when the government directs us to act contrary to God's Word. This is the only exception to God's command to obey the government. When the government ordered the disciples not to preach about Jesus, the Book of Acts reports: "Peter and the other apostles replied: 'We must obey God rather than men!'" (Acts 5:29).
- It is our duty as Christians to pay taxes. St. Paul directs in Romans 13:7: "Give everyone what you owe him. If you owe taxes, pay taxes." And when Jesus was asked about paying taxes to the Roman Empire, he replied: "Render to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's" (Matthew 22:21).
- God wants us to pray for our rulers. St. Paul writes in 1 Timothy 2:1-2: "I urge, then, first of all, that requests, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for everyone—for kings all all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness. This is good, and pleases God our Savior."

So as you celebrate Independence Day, give thanks to God for our government, and pray that our rulers may be blessed with godly wisdom.

They will be considered for adoption at the next quarterly Voters Assembly, following worship on July 24.

Everyone is invited to attend and participate in discussions of this topic and study guide, facilitated by congregational chairman Greg Windler during the Bible Class hour at 9:00am on Sundays, July 10 & 17.

Even if you cannot attend these sessions, everyone is encouraged to review the study guide and please let Greg Windler or Pastor Vogts know if you have additional questions or concerns.



The quarterly meeting of the Voters Assembly will be held following worship on Sunday, July 24. In order to prepare for this meeting the Church Council will meet Tuesday, July 19 at 7:00pm.



Eleven were present to conduct our business at the Blocktoberfest Committee meeting at the Shelter House on May 22.

We discussed our Blocktoberfest logo. Design4Sports has added an orange color to the background to make our banners stand out more. It really looks good. So, we decided to have them make a large banner and a medium sized banner for this year. They will have Saturday, September 17 on them as well. We will get our other banners and yard signs updated as we have in the past.



More Blocktoberfest T-shirts may be ordered after we take inventory of our existing stock. We discussed the possibility of getting some long sleeved tees as well.

Sharon has received the quote from the Ice Hut. It is basically the same as last year. It worked out well having all our ice in one freezer in a covered trailer.

Stan got word that Mo Trail will have his pony and cart available for a three hour period event day. They will replace the horseback ride we had last year which is no longer available.

Many people today don't carry much cash with them and use a credit or debit card for their purchases. So, we looked into the possibility of providing that service for event day consumers. ### Trinity Youth Attend LCMS National Youth Gathering

From July 16-20, 16 youth and eight adult leaders and other chaperones from Trinity, led by Youth Director Janette Reinke, will have the experience of a lifetime as they join over 35,000 other LCMS youth and adults from around the nation at the 2016 LCMS National Youth Gathering in New Orleans. This city was selected as one of the few able to host such a huge group—so big that the daily worship services will be held in the Superdome, which will be packed to overflowing!

Held every the years since 1980, the LCMS Youth Gathering provides thousands of youth and adults the opportunity to come together as a community of God's people to learn more about Jesus Christ, the Christian faith, and their identity as Missouri Synod Lutherans.

During the five days of the Gathering, youth spend time together in God's word, worship, service, and fellowship with others from across the Synod. In addition to nightly worship at the Superdome, the youth can select from a wide variety of special interest sections held during the day at the riverfront convention center.

The theme for this year's gathering is "In Christ Alone," based on the book of Philippians. During the five days of the Gathering, participants will study the Apostle Paul's words to the Christians at Philippi, reflecting upon the key concepts of identity, humility, and community. Using the book of Philippians, we will hear and profess that it is indeed in Christ alone we stand.

Our congregation actually has the *most* youth attending out of all the LCMS churches in our Johnson-Miami County Circuit! Our youth will be travelling to New Orleans by bus, shared with youth from Calvary Lutheran Church, Kansas City, Missouri.

Thank you to everyone who so generously supported our youth's many fundraising efforts so that we could reduce the cost for them to attend to a minimum. Please pray for our youth and their adult chaperones while they are gone, for safe travels, good health, protection, and also fun and spiritual growth. Later in the summer we will have a special service led by our youth to share their exciting experiences.
