Thou Shalt Honor Thy Father and Thy Mother

Do you know what are the three most widely celebrated holidays in the world? First is Christmas, when we remember how God became man to be our Savior; second is Easter, when we remember how our Savior Jesus Christ died on the cross to pay for our sins, and rose from the dead to bring us eternal life; and third is Mother's Day. The amazing thing about that is, we've been celebrating Christmas and Easter for some 2,000 years, but Mother's Day has been around for less than a century.

The first Mother's Day church service was held in Grafton, West Virginia on May 10, 1908. It was organized by Miss Anna M. Jarvis, often called the founder of Mother's Day. The idea actually came from her own mother, Mrs. Anna R. Jarvis. Mrs. Jarvis often said she wished someone should start a special day to honor the contributions of mothers. After Mrs. Jarvis' death in 1905, her daughter, Miss Jarvis, began a nationwide campaign to see her mother's wish fulfilled. Miss Jarvis wrote letters, traveled the country making speeches, and spent the family fortune, all to promote the idea of Mother's Day.

In 1914, the wish of Mrs. Jarvis and the campaigning of Miss Jarvis were fulfilled when President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed the second Sunday in May as an official national holiday honoring mothers. The second Sunday in May was selected for this new holiday because it was closest to the date of death of Miss Jarvis' own mother. And so was created the third most celebrated holiday in the world: Mother's Day.

It is really very fitting that this new holiday has already attained the kind of status we give to Christmas and Easter. For in a way, Mother's Day also is a Christian holiday. The Lord commands, "Thou shalt honor thy father and thy mother, that it may be well with thee, and thou mayest live long on the earth." As Martin Luther says in his explanation to this commandment, "We should fear and love God that we may not despise our parents and master, nor provoke them to anger, but give them honor, serve and obey them, and hold them in love and esteem."

One of the many things Miss Jarvis did to promote Mother's Day was to stand on streetcorners passing out red and white carnations. Miss Jarvis wanted the carnation to become the symbol of Mother's Day. She asked people to wear a carnation—red, if you mother is living; white, if your mother is deceased. "Honor Your Mother;" and if your mother has gone to heaven, honor her memory. "Honor Your Mother" and give thanks to God for her.

It is God who gave us our mothers, and it is God's will that you "Honor Your Mother." Remember that our Lord Jesus Christ, even as he hung dying on the cross, remembered his mother, Mary, committing her to the care of a beloved disciple. Children, like our Lord, "Honor Your Mother," by obeying her, helping her, and showing her respect and love.

Husbands and fathers, it is God who gave you the mother of your children. You will best honor her simply by being true to your wedding vows: "To have and to hold from this day forward; for better, for worse; for richer, for poorer; in sickness and in health; to love and to cherish; til death do us part." Show her affection and love, as St. Paul says in Ephesians, "Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the Church and gave himself up for her."

At the first Mother's Day service in 1908, Miss Jarvis explained the four purposes of Mother's Day:

- 1) To honor our mothers;
- 2) To bring families together;
- 3) To make us better children;
- To brighten the lives of good mothers.

This Mother's Day, and throughout the year, "Honor Your Mother."

Freewill donations will go toward youth activities. Following the dinner the Sunday School will present an Easter program. Come for worship—stay for the good food and fellowship!



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


New Luther Movie Screening May 30

As a gift to the world for the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation in 2017, our Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod has released a new professionally produced theatrical movie that dramatically portrays the issues, events, and people behind the Reformation movement. Made in conjunction with PBS, *Martin Luther: The Idea That Changed the World* was filmed at authentic Reformation-era sites in Eastern Europe, and is narrated by Hugh Bonneville, star of Downton Abbey.

Rev. Andrew and Kelsey Schlund, with their daughter Charlotte, were assigned by the Synod to serve as career missionaries in Mexico upon his seminary graduation in 2016.

Since 2016, Rev. Andrew Schlund has served as pastor of El Buen Pastor (Good Shepherd) Lutheran Church in Mexico City. As a career missionary, Schlund will likely serve this small parish for at least five years, or perhaps longer, until one of the Mexican seminarians is ready to be ordained.



"It was originally an English-speaking congregation that has been around for about 70 years," Schlund explained. "But now it has a bilingual ministry, that still tries to reach out to expats of the United States, but also has a good Spanish ministry too. They like to emphasize good doctrine and reaching out into the community to serve people and their needs."

Schlund is one of only two LCMS missionaries serving in the whole country of Mexico, which is quite a privilege and responsibility considering that the population in Mexico City alone is more than 25 million people. Together with Rev. Daniel Conrad, the other career missionary in Mexico, Schlund helps to affirm a Lutheran presence in the city, while Conrad provides assistance in sending out workers to share the Gospel. Conrad also serves as interim pastor to another local congregation in Mexico City, San Pedro (St. Peter's) Lutheran Church.

Somewhat unusually for a career missionary, there are dozens of similarities between Schlund's work in Mexico and that of a "typical" parish pastor in the United States: budgets, issues within the membership, visitation, feeding and teaching the people, and catechism classes, to name a few.

"We have a worship service every Sunday at 10:30 in a sanctuary that looks like many I have attended in the United States," Schlund explained. "Currently it takes me a couple days to complete my sermon in both English and in Spanish and so that takes up most of my time," he added. "I also have two confirmation classes, one for two adult Spanish speakers and the other for the children of expat familes. I am also working on learning more Spanish, as well as preparing the service for the coming Sunday. We also have an adult confirmation class about the basics of the Lutheran faith."

Of course, not every aspect of parish life is typical for Schlund, and he still has particular challenges to overcome, just like any other missionary sent to a foreign locale—especially considering that he is still in his first year of serving as a pastor in the Lord's Church.



El Buen Pastor (Good Shepherd) Lutheran Church in Mexico City was originally established 70 years ago by expat Lutherans as an English-speaking congregation, but now has a bilingual ministry that also reaches out to Spanish-speaking natives.

"I am a pastor fresh out of the seminary, so this has made things more challenging for me," he said. "I am serving a congregation, mostly in Spanish, and I do not have the experience that most pastors have. The language barrier has made it difficult to understand what is happening. There are times when I think I know what's going on and then something happens that proves I did not understand the situation. There are just certain cultural differences that I can't put into words yet, but they certainly make life different here." Not all differences are so bad, of course. "The potlucks are more delicious heresorry, congregations in the states!" he added. "It's hard to beat authentic Mexican food, in my opinion."

Thankfully, Schlund has found an ally in the congregation, a well-catechized parishioner named Alejandro Arevalo, who now serves the parish by leading a Bible study and assisting wherever he's needed. "Alejandro has been a key part of my adjustment to serving at Buen Pastor," Schlund said. "He also serves as my assistant during worship, and he makes the bulletins. After church, our family and several other members pile into his minivan, dubbed the 'Lutheran mobile,' and Alejandro and his family give us rides home."

Schlund's family—his wife, Kelsey, and toddler daughter, Charlotte—also have enjoyed the adjustment to life in Mexico City, despite the occasional challenge. "Overall, we really enjoy living in the city," Kelsey Schlund said. "There's lots of parks and delicious restaurants near where we live. Mexico City has many fascinating cultural and historic sites. Going out and exploring new places is fun for us, and it gives us many opportunities to practice our Spanish. Apart from learning the language, the biggest challenge has been figuring out how to use public transportation," she added. "This makes simple things, like running errands, more complicated. The traffic here can be horrible, so we need to strategically plan when we're going out so we avoid the major rush hours. It's been interesting trying to adjust to life without a car. However, we have found it easier to live without it. Uber has been our best friend."

As is standard anywhere in the world, children are often better than adults at overcoming challenges and learning new ways of life. "Charlotte's adjusted well to life here," Kelsey Schlund said. "She loves walking around the city and visiting new places. She's picked up on some cultural norms, like kissing people on the cheek when they say hello and goodbye, and she's learning some Spanish words. She'll probably learn Spanish faster than we will!"

Similar to the experience of other parish pastors, the joys of the ministry whether one is serving as a career missionary in Mexico City or in the rural American Midwest—are bountiful and always rooted in God's Word.


"One of my greatest joys is learning about the passion that the members of this church have for this congregation," Rev. Schlund said. "I would like this parish to be focused on God's Word, focused on His Sacraments, because I firmly believe that, from that, people reach out to one another, people gather other people into His Church, and we can be a place that is loving, caring, a place centered on Jesus and what He has done for us, focused on His work in the world, and gathering all nations to Himself. So I'd very much like it to be a place about the Gospel, and that's my main goal."



Bible Class on Scripture Lessons Concludes in May


