On July 4, 1853 Dr. C.F.W. Walther, the founding President of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, was asked to give an address for Independence Day to a youth gathering. The following is excerpted and adapted from his comments:

It was seventy-seven years ago today, on the 4th of July, 1776, when thirteen English colonies solemnly declared their independence. Therefore, today is most important for all of us, for whom this nation has become our second homeland.

However, if you should desire that I blend my voice in the accustomed manner of those who appear before our nation's citizens on this day, that is to say, should you expect me to present a tribute to the ingenuity of *man*, which has erected the astounding, great, glorious, and richly blessed edifice of this Republic, then you will, of course, be disappointed in me.

There are indeed innumerable advantages and benefits by virtue of which our newly adopted fatherland surpasses all other countries, showered upon it especially since the venerable Declaration of Independence. I would be worse than blind if I did not recognize this.

For, the country that we have chosen as our new home stands before our eyes, and the eyes of an admiring world, as the greatest miracle—a tree grown high beyond comparison, laden with the golden fruits of human industry, and also covered with developing blossoms that promise to bear continually the greatest new fruits of human endeavor.

Under its protecting, widespread branches, ever-increasing multitudes from all tongues and nations are gathering, a conflux of people from all tribes, that here exchange their talents and experiences. Thus, the gifts and attainments of all nations are brought together here, to make our nation the greatest on earth.

But, I am a Christian! As highly as I value the gifts and virtues of this Republic, by which its founders have rightly earned lasting fame in the history of nations,



Dr. C.F.W. Walther (1811-1887) was one of the pastors who led the Saxon Lutheran immigrants from Germany to America in 1839, settling near St. Louis. This group was the catalyst for formation of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod in 1847, with Walther as its first President. He served concurrently as the first President and leading professor at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, Due to his great love for the church's youth this article was originally an address to a youth gathering on the Fourth of July—the "Walther League" Lutheran youth group was named in his honor.

and which are reflected in the Constitution under which we live as citizens, nevertheless as a Christian I could never give praise and thanksgiving for all this to mere mortals.

For, as a Christian I know and believe that God the Lord alone has given success to every accomplishment, and granted His blessing to every achievement. Only God the Lord governs the destiny of nations, and bestows success and prosperity. It was He who gave wisdom and power to prompt and bring to fulfillment a new national government in this land, under which our people live in prosperity and peace. So, in considering this Union of States today, I do so as a theologian, Christian preacher, and servant of the Church, and naturally look at it in relation to religion. Christianity, and the Church.

It is quite fitting that State and Church, the civic and religious life, are here in this land separated from one another, in such a way that the State does not inquire how its citizens come to God, or what they trust for their salvation. For, a religion that is compelled to call upon the arm of a temporal power for protection, propagation, and subjection of its enemies admits that it no longer has a world-conquering power in itself because the sword of the Word of God is not in its hand. Therefore, it is not the true religion, and will not be able to bring the kingdom of heaven and its eternal treasures to the world. So, instead it corrupts the Church by mixing it with worldly kingdoms.

A State is certainly not an institution of God by which its citizens are to be led to eternal life. The State is rather a limited arrangement of God for this life, established for order in the world, so that what is mine and yours should be protected, that justice and righteousness be meted out, that each one may live quietly and undisturbed with his family.

As regards religion, the State is concerned only that no one seeks by force to hinder the other from honoring and worshipping God according to the conviction of his conscience. I maintain that this religious freedom is one of the brightest stars in the banner of our new fatherland!

Sadly, it is also true that under the protection of our religious liberty the voices of deceitful false teachers likewise sound loud and clear, and thousands of innocent hearts are offended, poisoned, and misled, and scores of immortal souls are being hurled into the abyss of destructive errors! However, as great as this evil is, nevertheless it is heavily outweighed by the blessings that religious liberty brings.

Thrice blessed be this day! For, on it the foundation of a State was laid in which freedom of religion and conscience has been made a principle of government. Blessed is this land in which we enjoy this freedom! Only let us make use of this freedom faithfully, for God will ask us to give strict account of how we have taken advantage of this incredibly great gift for the exercise of our faith.

As this country offers freedom to religion, so may religion bring to it heavenly blessings. And as citizens of this country, let us work zealously, fight bravely, and, if need be, shed our blood willingly, that

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this country may remain free, and that it may, above all, retain religious liberty as the most precious jewel in its crown of freedom, and thus be and remain a refuge for all who are exiled for Christ's sake from nations around the world.

May the Lord of nations, who up to now has so evidently ruled over and blessed this nation, continue to let His face graciously shine over our Republic. May He confound all attacks which the enemies of this Union may make upon its freedom, and raise up in this land, to His glory, a pious, free, and happy people. And may He always place as leaders over us virtuous men of wisdom and fearless, strong action.

Hail to thee, America! Hail! Hail!
