

Ten Reasons to Trust the Bible

Those who strive to live by the Bible's teachings are confronted by the disbelieving dominant worldview of our modern culture, that presumes the Bible isn't actually true. We may not be sure what to make of such skepticism about the Book we love, or how to respond. Here's a brief summary of *Ten Reasons to Trust the Bible*.

• Manuscript Evidence — There are astronomically more copies of the biblical manuscripts, with remarkable consistency between them, than there are for any other work of ancient literature.

Because of disasters such as the famous fire which destroyed the ancient library at Alexandria, Egypt, we have very few copies of most ancient writings, and those we do have usually date from thousands of years later.

We have only seven copies of any works by Plato, the oldest dating to 900 A.D., some 1,200 years after Plato; ten copies of works by Caesar, the oldest dating to 900 A.D., some 1,000 years after Caesar; 49 copies of works by Aristotle, the oldest dating to 1100 A.D., some 1,400 years after Aristotle; and it's the same with most other ancient authors. Yet, no one doubts the historical accuracy of these writings, or the existence of figures such as Plato, Caesar, and Aristotle.

In contrast, museums and libraries all around the world have not just a few dozen, but *tens of thousands* of ancient, handwritten copies of portions of the New Testament. The oldest is from the Gospel of John and dates to 120 A.D., only about 30 years the Apostle wrote his Gospel.

"There is no body of ancient literature in the world which enjoys such a wealth of good textual attestation as the New Testament" (F. F. Bruce, The New Testament Documents: Are They Reliable?)



The motto of the Lutheran Reformation in Latin is *Verbum Dei Manet in Aeternum*, represented by this symbol of the letters *VDMA*. It is based on 1 Peter 1:24-25 and means, *"The Word of the Lord Endures Forever."*

Many people aren't aware that the entire discipline of archaeology had its beginnings as biblical archaeology. In the 1800s, critics of the Bible asserted that the lands and cities described in its pages were a complete fantasy, like maps of mythical "Middle Earth" found in books of the "Lord of the Ring" series. These skeptics challenged Bible believers, that if they ever actually went to the Ancient Near East and tried to locate the features described in the Bible, they would find nothing.

In response, Queen Victoria sponsored the Palestinian Exploration Fund—still in existence—to conduct excavations in the Holy Land. And what did they find? *Everything was exactly as described in the pages of the Bible!* The more we dig, the more archaeology confirms the accuracy of the Bible.

"It is important to note that Near Eastern archaeology has demonstrated the historical and geographical reliability of the Bible." (The New International Dictionary of Biblical Archaeology)

■ Eyewitness Accounts — The Bible was written by people who witnessed the events it describes; many were persecuted or put to death for their faith, but never changed their story. Would so many people die for something they knew was untrue? Would you?

"It is not a minor verification of Scripture that it has been sealed by the blood of so many martyrs, especially when we reflect that they died to render testimony to the faith." (John Calvin)

• Corroborating Accounts — There are extensive references in ancient sources outside the Bible to the events and people it describes.

For example, the writings of the Jewish historian Josephus, born in 37 A.D., "provide indispensable background material for the student of . . . New Testament history. In them, we meet many figures well known to us from the New Testament. Some of his writings provide direct commentary on New Testament references." (The New Bible Dictionary)

■ Literary Consistency — The Bible contains 66 books written over 1,500 years by some 40 different writers—yet it tells a remarkably unified story of God's plan of salvation, culminating in Jesus Christ. In contrast, if you've ever played the "telephone game," where people in a circle pass

around a statement by whispering it in each other's ears, you know how distorted a mere human message quickly becomes.

"There is indeed a wide variety of human authors and themes [in the Bible]. Yet behind these . . . there lies a single divine Author, with a single unifying theme." (John R. W. Stott, Understanding the Bible)

● Prophetic Consistency—There are over 300 specific prophecies in the Old Testament that are fulfilled in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ in the New Testament.

"The very dimension of the sheer fulfillment of prophecy of the Old Testament Scriptures should be enough to convince anyone that we are dealing with a supernatural piece of literature. . . God has Himself planted within the Scriptures an internal consistency that bears witness that this is His Word." (R.C. Sproul, Now That's a Good Question)

Expert Scrutiny — The early Church had extremely high standards for what books were judged to be authentic and therefore included in the Bible. A book had to have been written by an Apostle or someone in their immediate circle; had to conform to basic Christian teaching; and had to be in widespread use among many churches.

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It wasn't at all the case that the Church somehow gave these books authority; rather, they simply recognized the authority the books themselves naturally asserted among Christians, a careful process of, "the people of God in many different places coming to recognize what other believers elsewhere found to be true." (The New Bible Commentary)

9 Human Acceptance — A majority of the greatest leaders and thinkers in history have affirmed the truth and impact of the Bible.

"I believe the Bible is the best gift God has ever given man. All the good from the Savior of the world is communicated to us through this Book. But for it, we could not know right from wrong." (Abraham Lincoln)

Many famous scientists were and are devout Christians, including Sir Francis Bacon, who devised what we call the "scientific method." Sir Isaac Newton, considered the father of modern science, was a firm Bible believer, who in addition to his scientific discoveries wrote extensive Bible commentaries.

● Global Influence — The Bible has had an extraordinary influence on the laws, art, ethics, music, and literature of world civilization, far greater than any other book in history.

"Christianity is responsible for a disproportionately large number of the humanitarian advances in the history of civilization—in education, medicine, law, the fine arts, working for human rights, and even in the natural sciences..." (Craig L. Blomberg, Christian Apologetics: A Comprehensive Case for Biblical Faith)

© <u>Changed Lives</u> — Like Martin Luther, literally billions of people over the centuries have been transformed by the words of the Bible.

"As unnamed masses of Christians down through the ages have shown us, the Bible is the most reliable place to turn for finding the key to a life of love and good works." (T. M. Moore, The Case for the Bible)

That the Bible is so cherished—and still by far the most widely published, best-selling book in the world—is even more remarkable because we humans are self-centered creatures, but the Bible goes completely *against* so many aspects of our basic human behavior.

What draws us to this Book, even though it condemns our sinful ways? Just one more proof these writings are divinely inspired by a Higher Power, and could not be of mere human origin.

So, despite the skepticism of an unbelieving world, the Holy Bible truly is God's Word, inspired, inerrant, faithful, and reliable. This is expressed in a Latin phrase that became the motto of the Lutheran Reformation, *Verbum Dei Manet in Aeternum*, which is based on 1 Peter 1:24-25 and means, *"The Word of the Lord Endures Forever."*

"You can't fix everything. A lot of the situations you see, you want to help them all," says LCMS missionary Rev. Eddie Hosch of the people living amid poverty and other hardships in Lima, Peru. What's really important, he adds, is "to remind them that they are valuable in God's eyes, so they can always know that God is with them and that Jesus died for them."

That message has been embraced by many of the children who receive food for both body and soul from three Lutheran ministries that operate in this city as *Castillo Fuerte: Casa de Misericordiay* or *Mighty Fortress: House of Mercy*. Each provides after-school care, tutoring, and meals, along with opportunities to study the Bible and take part in worship.

Four young ladies who were taught the faith at *Castillo Fuerte* in La Victoria were confirmed last November, along with two adults. Among the confirmands were Fernando and his two daughters, Victoria and Naomi, who sparked their father s interest in Christianity. When he saw them reading the Bible and learning about Jesus, he, too, "wanted to learn more about the Gospel," he said.

Rev. Hosch was born in Warrensburg, Missouri and grew up in the Kansas City area. He received a bachelor's degree in education from Pittsburg State University, and a Master of Divinity from Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne. Before attending seminary he taught history at Arkansas City High School, and prior to serving in Peru he was pastor at Gethsemane Lutheran Church, Snellman, Minnesota, and Faith Lutheran Church, Churubusco, Indiana. In his free time, he enjoys hunting, fishing, and reading.

Melissa Hosch was born in Garnett, Kansas and her hometown is Richmond, Kansas. She also attended Pittsburg State University, receiving a bachelor's degree in technology. Before heading to Peru, Melissaworked for several school systems as a graphic designer and instructional and special education assistant. Melissa enjoys reading, fishing, walking, and bike riding. Rev. and Mrs. Hosch have two children, Alexandria (Lexi) and Joseph (Joe), who join them in the mission field.
