Beginning in 2002, following revelations in a Pulitzer Prize winning series of investigative articles, the Roman Catholic Church has been the subject of a growing scandal about homosexual conduct and sexual abuse among its clergy, and a cover-up of this scandal by its leadership. Because the Roman Catholic Church is the largest Christian denomination, both in the United States and worldwide, many non-Christians and marginal Christians naturally consider this body to be representative of Christianity in general. So, this scandal is very tragic, not only for Roman Catholics, but for all Christians.

Paul admonishes Christians to. "Be wise in the way you act toward outsiders; make the most of every opportunity" (Colossians 4:5). But, as Peter warns. such widely publicized "deprayed conduct" will instead "bring the way of truth into disrepute" (2 Peter 2:2), especially among those outside or on the margins of the Christian faith.

It is because the life of Christian clergy in particular will reflect, either positively or negatively, upon the Church as a whole, that Paul requires pastors must be "above reproach" and "have a good reputation with outsiders" (1 Timothy 3:2, 7). He explains the two-fold danger of tolerating Christian clergy who do not meet this high standard: "We put no stumbling block in anyone's path, so that our ministry will not be discredited" (2 Corinthians 6:3).

Christian clergy who do not live out the Christian faith in their own lives create a "stumbling block" for those, both within and outside the Church, who are rightly offended at their misconduct. and the Christian ministry thus becomes discredited. So, while the Roman Catholic Church is the focus of this scandal, it has a negative impact on all denominations, and is a matter of great concern and sadness for all Christians.





World renowned artist Lucas Cranach painted these portraits to celebrate the marriage of Martin Luther to Katharina von Bora. Cranach was actually Luther's best friend and neighbor in Wittenberg, it was Cranach who acted as the intermediary to arrange their marriage, and he was best man at their wedding. Cranach made many copies of the Luther wedding portraits, and this pair recently sold at auction in London for nearly a million dollars.

The root cause of this scandal is two-fold: innate human sinfulness. and unnatural clerical celibacy. Paul declares, "There is no one righteous, not even one. . . There is no difference. for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:10, 22-23). This universal sinful nature engulfs all of humanity—including Christian clergy of every denomination. So, we must confess with Paul, "What shall we conclude then? Are we any better? No, not at all . . . all alike are under sin" (Romans 3:9). However, although there are cases of sexual abuse and misconduct among clergy of all denominations, the reason such sexual scandals seem most pronounced in the Roman Catholic Church is because innate human sinfulness is exacerbated by their requirement for unnatural clerical celibacy.

It is important to note there is a distinction between *chastity* and *celibacy*. Chastity is using your sexuality in a manner pleasing to God, within the marriage relationship, between a man and a woman who are husband and wife. "Marriage should be honored by all. and the marriage bed kept pure, for God will judge the adulterer and all the sexually immoral" (Hebrews 13:4).

Celibacy, on the other hand, means totally abstaining from all sexual activity and relations. Paul himself was unmarried and celibate, and he acknowledges that for some persons this is a natural condition: "It is good for a man not to marry. . . I wish that all men were as I am. But each man has his own gift from God; one has this gift, another has that" (1 Corinthians 7:1, 7).

So, only those with this gift have a disposition suitable for celibacy, but all clergy, and indeed all Christians, are required to live in *chastity*, in thought, word, and deed: "But among you there must not be even a hint of sexual immorality, or of any kind of impurity . . . because these are improper for God's holy people. Nor should there be obscenity, foolish talk or coarse joking, which are out of place . . . For of this you can be sure: No person who is immoral or impure . . . has any inheritance in the kingdom of Christ and of God. Let no one deceive you with empty words, for because of such things God's wrath comes on those who are disobedient. Therefore do not be partners with them" (Ephesians 5:3-7).

We see clearly from the example of the Apostles themselves and the teaching of the New Testament that lacking the gift of celibacy does exclude a man from service as a minister in the Christian Church. In fact, Paul actually denounces requiring celibacy as a demonic doctrine: "The Spirit clearly says that in later times some will abandon the faith. and follow deceiving spirits and doctrines of demons. Such teachings come through hypocritical liars who . . . forbid people to marry" (1 Timothy 4:1-3). Rather than mandating unnatural clerical celibacy, Paul lists among the qualifications for a man to serve as a pastor that he be "the husband of one wife" and "He must manage his own family well and see that his children obey him with proper respect" (1 Timothy 3:2, 4).

Declaring his own celibacy to be a voluntary choice, Paul explicitly states that the other Apostles were married: "Don't we have the right to take a believing wife along with us, as do the other Apostles, and the Lord's brothers, and Peter?" (1 Corinthians 9:5).

Ironically, though the Roman Catholic Church erroneously claims that Peter was the "first pope," both Paul in this passage and the Gospels report that Peter was in fact married: "When Jesus came into Peter's house, He saw Peter's mother-in-law lying in bed with a fever. He touched her hand and the fever left her, and she got up and began to wait on Him" (Matthew 8:14-15; see also Mark 1:29-31, Luke 4:38-39).

God created humans as male and female, and then commanded us to "be fruitful and multiply" (Genesis 1:27-28). It is part of God's plan for creation that the vast majority of humans do not have the gift of celibacy. Requiring celibacy of those who do not possess this gift is not God-pleasing, but unnatural, dangerous, contrary to God's will and plan for humanity—including clergy.

Paul says, "No temptation has seized you except what is common to man. And God is faithful; He will not let you be tempted beyond what you can bear. But, when you are tempted, He will also provide a way out, so that you can stand up under it" (1 Corinthians 10:13). For those who lack the gift of celibacy, Paul explains the "way out" of sexual temptation that God Himself has graciously provided: "Since there is so much immorality, each man should have his own wife, and each woman her own husband. The husband should fulfill his marital duty to his wife, and likewise the

wife to her husband. The wife's body does not belong to her alone, but also to her husband. In the same way, the husband's body does not belong to him alone, but also to his wife. Do not deprive each other, except by mutual consent and for a time, so that you may devote yourselves to prayer. Then come together again, so that Satan will not tempt you because of your lack of self-control" (1 Corinthians 7:2-5). So, rather than restraining sexual sins, unnatural clerical celibacy actually exacerbates the problem. As Paul concludes, "It is better to marry than to burn with passion" (1 Corinthians 7:9).

Though he was content to remain unmarried, Luther caught the eye of former nun Katharina von Bora and she pursued him!

There is debate about when celibacy became required for clergy in the Roman Catholic Church. That this was not the custom of the earliest Church can be seen from the fact that the New Testament makes clear the Apostles themselves—even Peter, the supposed "first pope"—were married. Historical records indicate that for hundreds of years most priests, bishops, and even popes were married and had children. For example, similar to the Bush father-son Presidents, Pope Hormisdas (514-23 A.D.) was actually the father of Pope Silverius (536-37 A.D.). For about 1,000 years mandatory clerical celibacy seems to have been a notion which ebbed and flowed, came and went, here and there. It wasn't until 1139 A.D. that a universal requirement of celibacy was imposed on Roman Catholic Clergy.

Martin Luther stated that he personally did not have difficulty maintaining celibacy as a monk, and could have remained celibate for the rest of his life. However, he caught the eye of former nun Katharina von Bora—and *she* pursued *him*! Since the start of the Reformation other Protestant clergy had already become married, but it was Luther's own marriage on June 13, 1525 that marked the definitive end of clerical celibacy among Lutherans and other Protestants.

Throughout the American Edition of Luther's Works, Luther frequently denounces unnatural celibacy as "ungodly, abominable, disgraceful, destructive, vulgar, impure, spurious, monstrous, hellish." Luther was so violently opposed to mandatory clerical celibacy because he realized very few humans have this gift: "Manis not created for celibacy but to multiply... unless his nature is altered or hindered by God's supreme grace and a special miracle."

Luther explains that, rather than promoting chastity, a disdain for marriage and requiring celibacy of those without this gift actually promotes unchastity, as we sadly see still today in the scandals of homosexual conduct and sexual abuse among clergy in the Roman Catholic Church: "In comparison to married life celibacy . . . stinks before God . . . The monks also pay the penalty they deserve for this contempt of marriage on their part . . . they have fallen into monstrous shamelessness and lust . . . fornication, adultery, incest . . . and Sodomite depravity."

Summing up this topic, the Augsburg Confession of the Lutheran Church states: "The assertion that priests and clergymen may marry is based on God's Word and command. Besides, history demonstrates both that priests were married, and that the vow of celibacy has been the cause of so much frightful and unchristian offense, so much adultery, and such terrible, shocking immorality, and abominable vice" (Article XXIII).

Despite this harsh criticism, Luther still held the Roman Catholic Church to be a Christian body: "I honor the Roman Church. God has preserved in it Holy Baptism, the reading of the Gospel, the forgiveness of sins and Absolution, and the Sacrament of the Altar. Now where these things still exist, there the Church and holy believers are to be found." And we likewise must acknowledge today that the vast majority of Roman Catholic priests are upright men, who are themselves horrified by the homosexual conduct and sexual abuse committed by a comparatively small number of hypocritical scoundrels within their ranks.

Many commentators have observed that what the Roman Catholic Church needs to today is "another Martin Luther." However, Luther understood that the problem runs much deeper than moral failings such as these. It is a principle of Lutheran theology that every false doctrine or practice can ultimately be traced back to false teaching regarding the chief article of the Christian faith: salvation by grace through faith alone.

The root cause of homosexual conduct and sexual abuse among Roman Catholic clergy is requiring unnatural clerical celibacy; and in turn the root cause of mandatory celibacy is the Roman Catholic doctrine of salvation by works. That is because forcing oneself into unnatural celibacy is considered to be the ultimate sacrifice, the ultimate good work by which one can earn salvation—and therefore a fitting requirement for their priests.

Once the false teaching of salvation by works is demolished, so is the rationale for mandatory celibacy. That's how it happened with the Reformation. Luther didn't begin by attacking and overthrowing celibacy. He attacked and overthrew the false teaching of salvation by works, and as a side effect of overthrowing this chief false doctrine, the false requirement of mandatory celibacy was also naturally overthrown, by the true teaching of salvation by grace through faith alone.

Actually, the misguided "sacrifice" of unnatural clerical celibacy means absolutely nothing to God, as Jesus declares: "In vain they do worship Me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men" (Matthew 15:9).




150th Anniversary Celebration November 4


